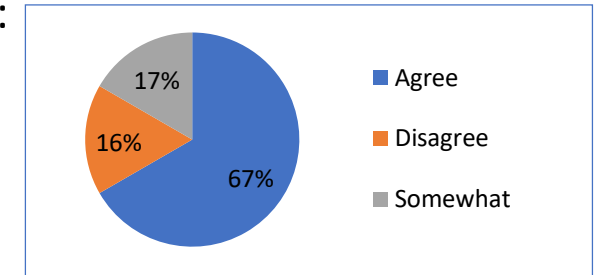

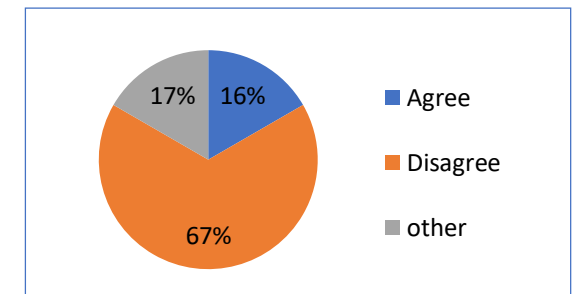

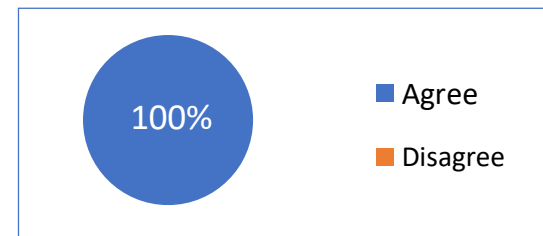

2019: Moving Forward

From the survey submissions we learned,

1. Most attended with an organization
2. 40 to 160 miles traveled to attend
3. Majority said cancer education was the most helpful
4. Many wanted to learn more about pesticides, advocacy and mental health
5. 100% would attend the conference again
6. Risks and prevention
7. Formal invitations and a focus on local businesses attending
8. Most said it was relatively easy for them to attend last year

Changes to 2019:

- Incorporate more tips on prevention for all who attend
- More information in our cancer education presentation about pesticides
- Invite additional Legislative Representation
- Survivor Panel to share their mental health tools
- Marketing materials to be formal invitations
 - As well as offering special level of sponsorship to local businesses

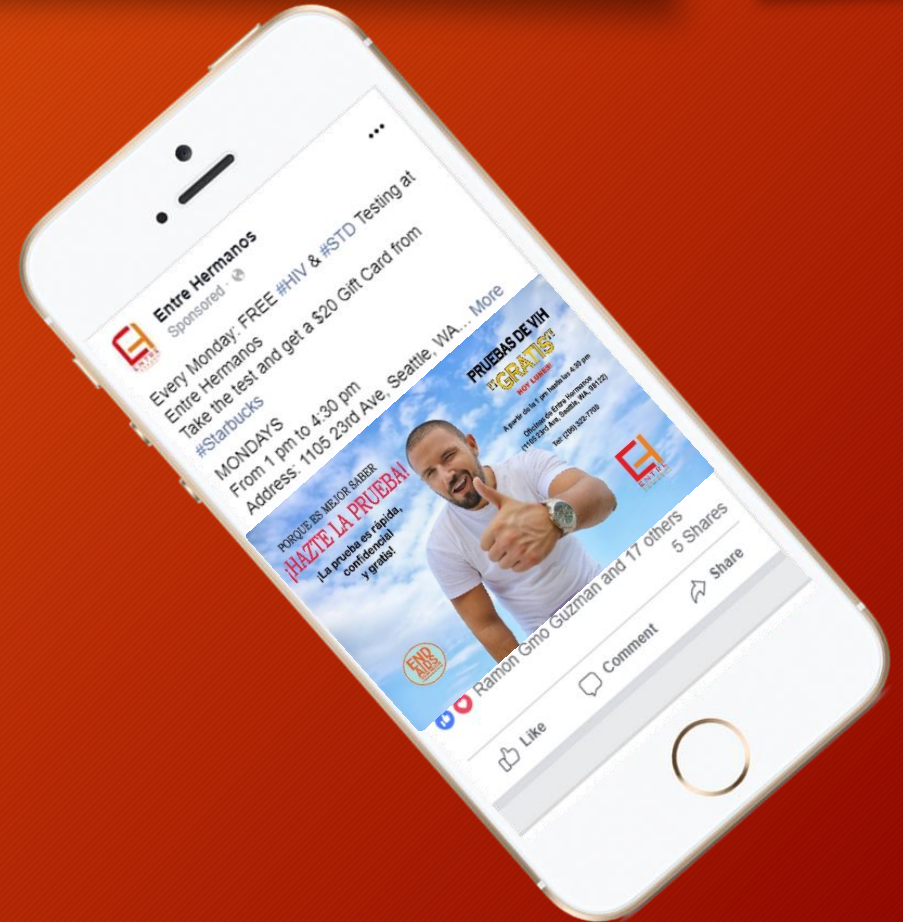

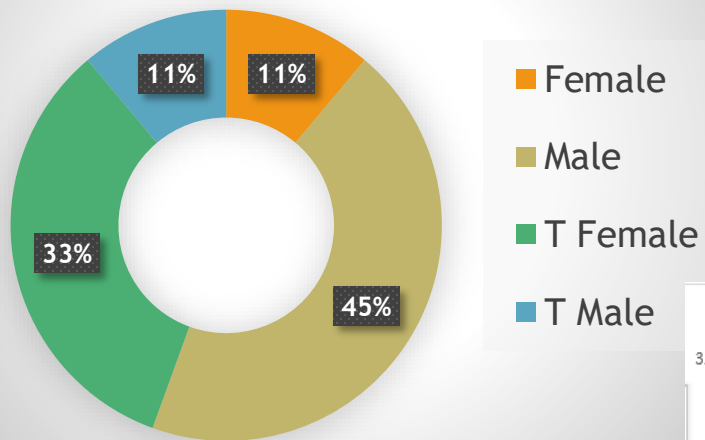

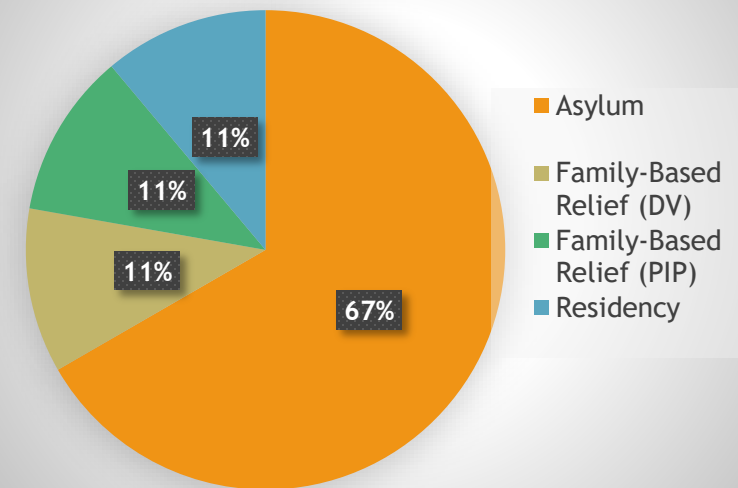

Breakdown of Gender Identity

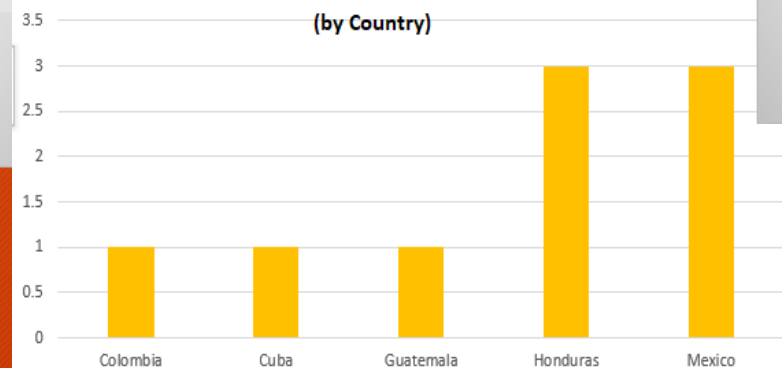

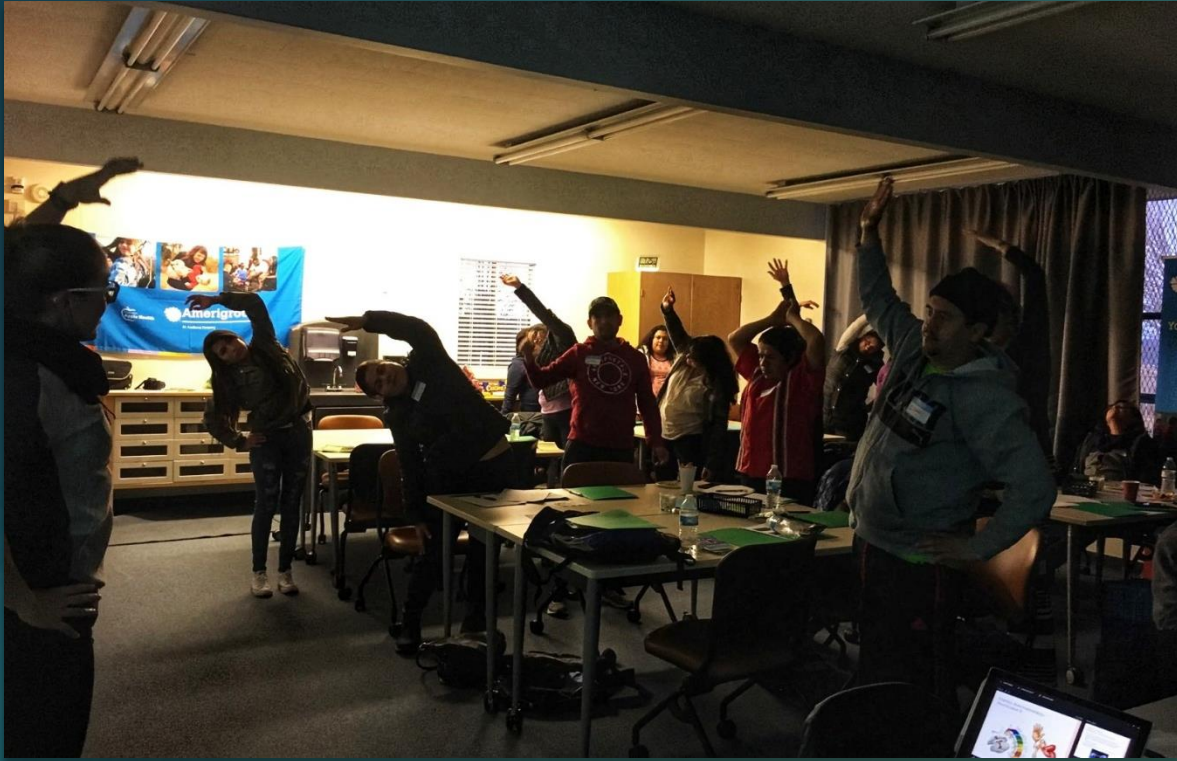
